Parent Survey findings

Overall findings

Of the 103 parents that responded 93% graded the pupil behaviour at St Leonard's as good or outstanding.

Of the 103 parents that responded 21% graded the pupil behaviour at St Leonard's as outstanding.

Of the 103 parents that responded 72% graded the pupil behaviour at St Leonard's as good.

Parents felt the school dealt effectively with unacceptable behaviour (86%), a small number disagreed (5%) with (9%) not knowing.

Parents felt the school encouraged children to have a healthy lifestyle (94%). and high expectations for their children to do their best (96%).

What do you think makes children behave well in school?

All responses given were over 90% except for knowing whether their children were getting a good education (77%). Whilst some parents disagreed (17%) there were also a number who recorded a 'don't know' response (7%)

Parents felt that liking the lessons; getting rewards; being praised; being happy; and keeping in touch with parents were highly successful in encouraging the children to behave well (99%, 94%, 93%, 93%, 92%).

Why do you think some children behave badly in school?

In the parents' opinion children behave badly mostly when they are angry about something (80%) or they are showing off in front of their friends (84%).

There were a high number of 'don't know' responses in this section of the survey.

Whilst 49% of parents said that the teacher didn't listen to their side of the story, 29% said they did and 21% didn't know.

Child Survey findings (participating year groups 3, 4, 5, and 6)

Behaviour

The results of the survey undertaken by 115 children reveal that the majority of children felt they behaved well in lessons (94%); moved around the school appropriately (97%) and there was respect for other children, teachers and support staff (95%). When the children were asked for their opinion of the behaviour of other the results dropped slightly.88% of the children felt that behaviour around the school was good and allowed them to learn. 81% indicated that general behaviour was good and safe. Whilst the 'Hardly ever' option didn't pull the overall result down significantly, the increase came in the 'Sometimes' column in particular in class 3 and class 5 and to some extent class 6.

There is a clear understanding of the consequences of poor behaviour (92%) and that the school has high expectations about behaviour (98%). (94%) of children felt that there was a respect and tolerance for people of all faiths, races and cultures.

<u>Safety</u>

Overall the majority of children felt safe (94%) and know how to keep safe (93%).

Learning about safety issues (82%) and having an understanding about bullying (88%) highlights the need to revisit these topics in assemblies and PHSE lessons.

However, there was a good majority who were confident that the school tackles incidents of bullying (91%) and the children knew what to do if they or someone else was being bullied (94%)

Recommendations

Share individual class results and findings with each class teacher to highlight any class specific issues.

Ensure that the school rules are a high profile and continually reinforced with the children.

Research and collate as many assemblies on the theme safety theme and work them into assembly rota.

Ask class teachers to find opportunities for the children to discuss and talk about different types of bullying including cyber bullying.
